of the Other part Witnesseth That said Irvine for and in Consideration
of the sum of five Pound Currant Money to him in hand paid the Receipt
whereof he doth Acknowledge hath granted Bargained sold & Confirmed
and by these Presents do Grant Bargain and sell Enfeoff and Confirm
unto the v. M. Cord his Heirs and Assigns a Certain Tract or Parcel of Land
situate lying and being in Bedford County Containing fifty Acres more or
less on the west side of the little Salings River and bounded as followeth
Viz Beginning at the mouth of a small Branch joining a Tract
of Land Convey'd by v. Irvine to James Newer Thence up the said Branch
Meanders to the Old Line Thence North a long the Old Line to a white
in Daniel Sullivan's Line Thence a long his Line S 14. E 72. Poles to a Pine
East 164 Pole to an Elm in Douhart's Line Thence a long his Line
S. 51. West. 60. Poles to a Pine on the South side of little Salings River thence
down - said River as it Meanders to the first station, which Tract of

and Assigns for ever WARRANT and Defend v. Land with all the
Appurtenances thereto belonging to the said M. Cord his Heirs & Assigns
free from the Claims or Demands of any Person or Persons whatsoever
and the v. Irvine doth agree & Oblige himself his Heirs and Assigns to do
& Execute any writing or Instrument of writing by him Directed
or by his Attorney law'd in the Law Directed to be done for the better
securing of right of v. Land & Premises with the Appurtenances in
Witness whereof the said Robert Irvine do set my Hand & Seal this 15 Day

for and in Consideration of the sum of one Hundred & twenty five Pound
Currant Money of Virginia to them in hand Paid the Receipt whereof
they do hereby Acknowledge, GIVEN granted and Confirmed & by
these Presents Doth give grant and Confirm unto the said Clark Terrell
Moorman his Heirs and Assigns for ever one Certain Tract or parcel of Land
Containing one Hundred and fifteen Acres lying & being in the County aforesaid
out both sides of Ivy Creek and bounded as follows so viz Beginning
at a white Oak standing near Cheese Creek in low grounds and running
thence now East one Hundred and Twenty six Poles to two white Oaks
joins at the root thence south thirty Degrees East one Hundred to a white
Oak sapling south fifty degrees west one Hundred & forty Poles to Pointers
North forty five Degrees west one Hundred twenty Poles to a white Oak
